	City of York Council submitted a Local Plan for public Examination in May 2018. Modifications to the submitted plan were
	consulted on in Spring 2023. Further modifications are proposed to policy H5: Gypsies and Travellers as required by the Local
	Plan inspectors in their correspondence of 7 May 2024 (<u>EX/INS/50</u>). The modifications are required to make policy H5, and the Local Plan as a whole, sound.
1.2	Are there any external considerations? (Legislation/government directive/codes of practice etc.)
	The Equalities Act 2010 provides a legal framework to protect the rights of individuals and advance equality of opportunity for all. It provides a discrimination law which protects individuals from unfair treatment and promotes a fair and more equal society. Under the Act, Gypsy, Roma and Traveller communities are specifically protected under the protected characteristics for 'Race'. Planning policy requirements regarding the spatial delivery of Gypsy, Roma and Traveller provision, must be evidenced based and in accordance with Planning Policy for Travellers (2023) and the National Planning Policy Framework (2023).

	Gypsy and Traveller communities : These communities will be impacted by the policy which seeks to safeguard existing Gypsy and Traveller sites and provide for future needs.
	City of York Council: The local authority is key stakeholder on the delivery of outcomes and engagement with GRT
	communities and is committed to producing a Local Plan for the city. The Council has made commitments through the Council
	Plan to deliver on our equalities duty, suitable housing provision for all and reducing health inequalities for its residents, all of which are relevant to the GRT community.

The Council Plan 2023-27 seeks to review options for and increase the supply of travellers' homes. It is intended that the policy will have a positive impact on housing provision for Gypsy and Traveller communities by safeguarding and improving existing sites and providing additional pitches over the plan period on various sites within York, both council owned and on strategic housing sites. Evidence, prepared to support the Local Plan and its spatial strategy, forecasts when development is likely to happen to demonstrate that recognised needs can be met throughout the timeframe of the plan.
This links to the Council Plan (2023-27) in relation to the positive impacts it will have on equalities and human rights, providing equal opportunities for all communities in our city.
Alongside a commitment to deliver additional pitches, it is known that council owned sites are in need of significant investment in order to improve the quality of accommodation and communal facilities on site. The proposed changes to policy H5 ensure that no further development occurs on the sites at Water Lane and Outgang Lane without approval of a masterplan to ensure improvements are implemented prior to further accommodation being provided on the sites.

There are no negative adverse impacts identified with the proposed modifications to policy H5 which seek to ensure existing pitches are safeguarded; additional pitch provision is made; and that the existing sites at Water Lane and Outgang Lane are not expanded without the implementation of improvements for existing pitches.

A stock condition survey of existing pitches has been undertaken and this will inform future investment on sites. The Local Plan sets the spatial strategy for the delivery of this requirement and seeks to demonstrate this in accordance with national policy.
